John P. Herrion, Esq., Acting General Counsel New York State Division of Human Rights

John P. Herrion is the Keynote Speaker at the 3rd Annual TRI Inclusion Festival. John is an attorney with extensive experience in disabilities rights.

In March 2008, Mr. Herrion became Director of Disability Rights for the New York State Division of Human Rights. In this capacity, he assists with the enforcement of the New York State's Human Rights Law provisions that prohibit discriminating against persons with disabilities.

Prior to working at the New York State Division of Human Rights, Mr. Herrion was Counsel to the United Spinal Association for two years, where he was represented and assisted persons with disabilities on a wide variety of issues related to employment housing and access to place of public accommodation.

Mr. Herrion has published articles and lectures extensively, including Continuing Legal Education programs (CLEs) for attorneys, on the rights of persons with disabilities. He is a past Chair and secretary of the New York City Bar Association's Committee on Legal Issues Affecting Persons with Disabilities.

Mr. Herrion holds a law degree from Pace University School of Law, and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Manhattan College.

Sue SerinoCounty Executive, ThinkACCESSIBLE

At age 15, Sue Serino went to work to help support her family and never stopped. From waiting tables at area restaurants, to managing a local diner, Sue spent years holding down two and three jobs to make ends meet and talking extensively with customers, listening and relating to their concerns. After finding herself a working single-mom, Sue started an in childcare business to ensure she could continue to financially support her family while caring for her own son.

Sue eventually began working in real estate where she specialized in helping first-time homebuyers make their Hudson Valley dreams a reality. As a successful small business owner, Sue experienced first-hand the frustration of excessive red tape and over-taxation that hinders economic development. Those experiences propelled her to get involved, leading to time spent on the Hyde Park Town Board and the Dutchess County Legislature before being elected to the New York State Senate.

As a State Senator, Sue spent 8 years representing residents of Dutchess County in Albany. There, she served as both the Chair and the Ranking Member of the Committee on Aging as well as the Ranking Member of the Committee on Cultural Affairs, Tourism, Parks and Recreation. During her tenure in the Senate, she stood out as a staunch advocate for seniors and caregivers, especially during the pandemic when she was an outspoken voice fighting to protect vulnerable nursing home residents.

On November 8, 2023, Sue Serino marked her return to public office as Dutchess County Executive. County Executive Serino implemented "ThinkACCESSIBLE" as one of the first initiatives within her new administration. The ThinkACCESSIBLE campaign will help raise public awareness about promoting accessibility and inclusivity for persons with disabilities within Dutchess communities and businesses.









Amanda Owen CEO, Founder, & Author Pieces of Me

Over a decade ago, Amanda left her position as a special education teacher to launch Puzzle Pieces, a Kentucky-based nonprofit that serves more than 400 individuals with disabilities, offering them targeted autism services, residential living, vocational training, supported employment, behavior services and more.

Amanda Owen is a nationally acclaimed author and speaker, as well as a sibling to her older brother Nick, who has a rare chromosomal disability. Growing up with Nick truly set the trajectory of Amanda's life, fueling her to advocate for those with disabilities to be included in their communities and live meaningful, fulfilled lives.

Through her children's book series, "Owen the Wonderer," Amanda hopes to teach children and educators about disabilities, acceptance, and inclusion. She advocates for health equity by helping healthcare professionals gain clarity, consistency, and research-based strategies for caring for patients with disabilities through her ACCESS Care training program.

Amanda also advises businesses on how to provide equitable and meaningful careers to those with disabilities. For individuals with a disability and their families, she speaks on the topic of discovering a whole-life journey to help loved ones build the life they desire.

Given her unique perspective as a sibling and service provider, Amanda has recently developed the SEEDS Strategy to support parents navigating life with both a child with a disability and a neurotypical child. Pamela Gunther is the Founder and CEO of Fit and Fun Playscapes®; an international company based here in Poughkeepsie that creates inclusive, movement-based products that help people of all ages and abilities lead a healthier lifestyle.

Pamela began her career as an Architect and holds a license to practice architecture in the State of New York. She was also a Planner for the Village of Port Chester and then worked within the real estate consulting industry for 10 years. She became the Vice President of Engineering at a large NYC real estate consulting firm, managing her team and teams of consultants, specializing in large building acquisitions and building systems.

Her career shifted when she got involved in a volunteer PTA project at her children's school painting recess games outside. Years later, two of her children were diagnosed with ADD and she dove into how physical activity could help without medications. These experiences inspired her to launch Fit and Fun Playscapes®, an online retailer of indoor, outdoor, and portable activities that get people moving.

For more than 13 years, in over 8,000 locations across the US, Canada, Australia, and the United Kingdom, Pam's brand has grown to offer hundreds of inclusive movement-based products that help children improve cognition function, academic performance, social emotional development, physical health and well-being, and reduce anxiety.

Under Pam's leadership, Fit and Fun was recognized as a resource by the CDC in 2017, for creating environments supportive of physical activity. She has been featured on PBS Close-Up, NBC News 4 NY, and CBS and currently serves on the board of Abilities First in the Hudson Valley.

Respect Ability

The original Disability Pride Flag was created by Ann Magill in 2019, and underwent a makeover by Magill for accessibility purposes in 2021. They altered the original zigzagged design because it aversely impacted symptoms for individuals with visually triggered disabilities, including seizure and migraine disorders. Magill's update design features muted colors and straight diagonal band from the top left to the bottom right corner.

The stripes represent different disabilities:

green is for sensory disabilities, including the blind, deaf, and deaf-blind communities;

blue represents emotional and psychiatric disabilities;

white stands for non-apparent and undiagnosed disabilities;

gold is for neurodivergence;


and red represents physical disabilities.
